Re: Special Assessment Renewal Legislation

The City's current street lighting and tree special assessment levies will expire at the end of 2022. These levies pay the City's electric bill for street lights, the salaries for the forestry department, and certain maintenance of streets including snow removal. The assessment is based on the amount of footage a property has on a City owned street. The current rates are \$0.92 per foot for the street lighting assessment and \$1.08 per foot for the tree assessment for a total of \$2.00 per foot.

These assessments have been in place for over 40 years. The fee was raised from \$1.80 to \$2.00 starting in 2014. As part of this renewal the street lighting fund (230) and the tree fund (231) were analyzed to see if the fee needed to be increased.

At the end of 2021 both funds had a healthy balance. Revenue is expected to remain the same as prior years. Salaries are expected to increase 2% and operating costs are held fairly stagnant. With these in mind, we believe the two funds can operate in 2023 and 2024 with no increase to the current special assessment fee. However, if salt and fuel prices continue to rise and the forestry department is fully staffed, the tree fund will most likely need a fee increase for the next special assessment in 2025.

The Problem



- According to Healthy Northeast Ohio (2022), in the 44112 zip code of Cleveland Heights, 80.6 percent of adults consumed sugar-sweetened beverages in the past 7 days and 44.2 percent of adults who used a quick service restaurant 6 times or more in the past 30 days.
 - Sugar-sweetened beverages are the leading source of added sugars in the American diet (CDC, 2021). Many fast food meals are heavily processed and contain added sugars, unhealthy fats, and salt (Despres, 2016).
- Added sugars contribute calories to your diet, but provide little nutritional value. Eating excessive foods and drinks with added sugars can lead to potential health problems such as poor nutrition, weight gain, increased triglycerides, and tooth decay. (Mayo Clinic, 2021)

Aggregate: Low-income adults age 45-65 in the 44112 zip code of Cleveland Heights, Ohio.

Risk:

- Limited income
 - Money may be more focused on housing, utilities, and other necessities
- Food desert
 - Less healthy options
- Difficulty finding time to cook/shop
 - Childcare, working, other responsibilities
- \$ of healthy food > \$ of unhealthy food
- Transportation difficulties
 - Takes longer to travel to and from grocery store
- (Vilar-Compte et al., 2021)

Importance: High sugar diets lead to long-term chronic health conditions, which leads to poorer quality of life and early mortality.

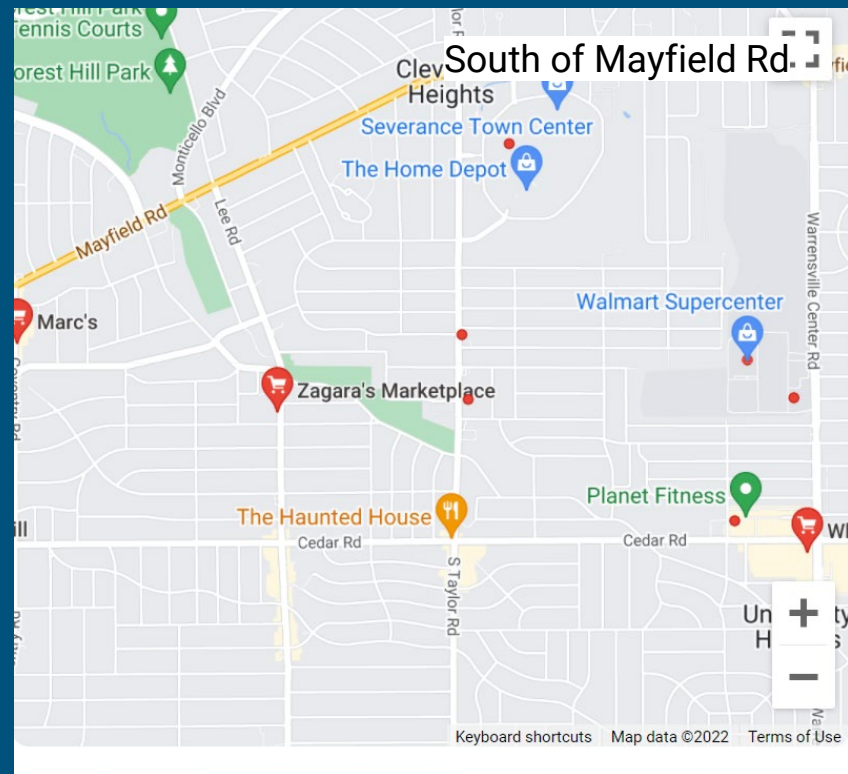
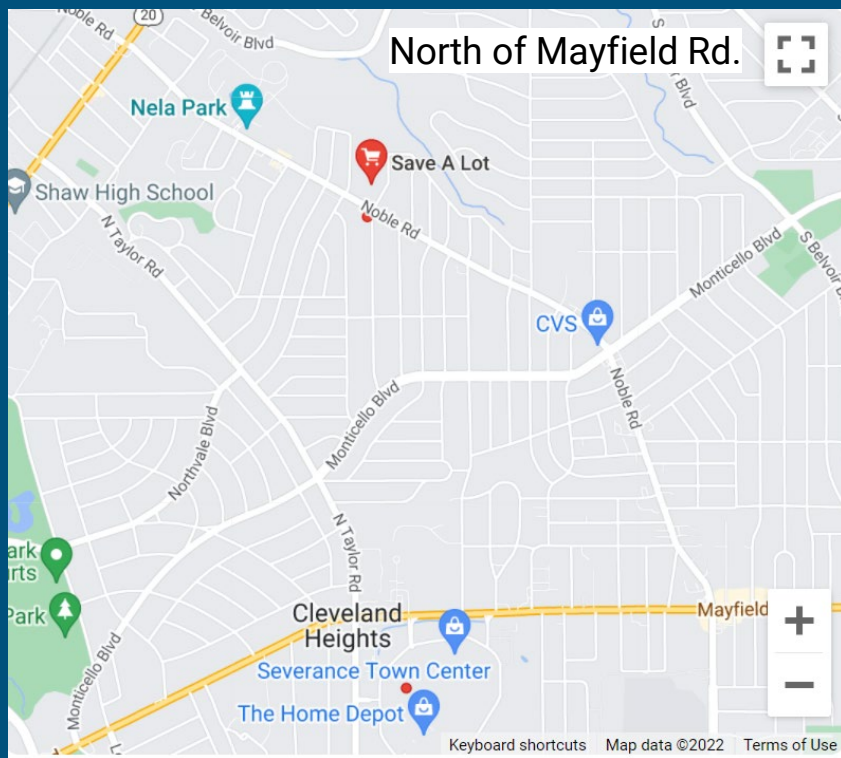

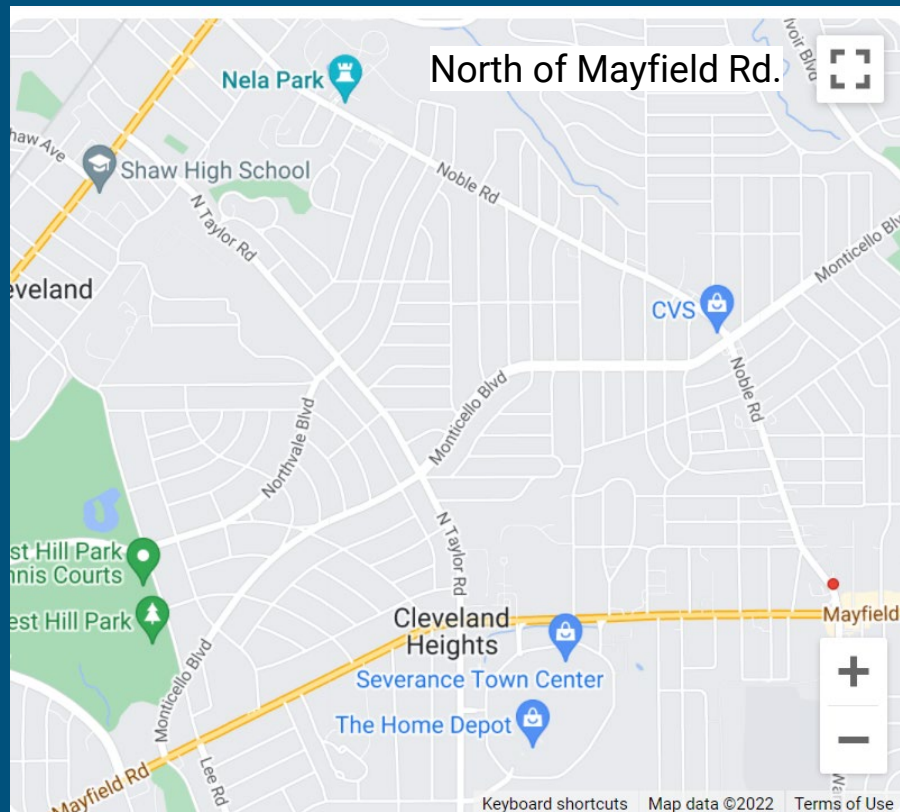

Grocery store density comparison north and south of Mayfield Rd in Cleveland Heights, Ohio



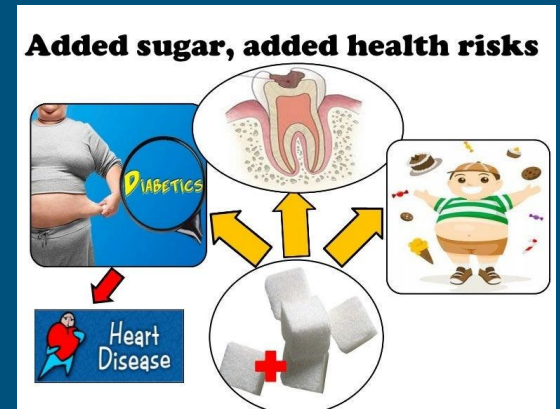
Restaurant density comparison north and south of Mayfield Rd in Cleveland Heights, Ohio

The Condition

- High sugar consumption aka “sugar overload”
- **NO** nutritional benefit from added sugars
- Increased sugar consumptions includes
 - Above 6 teaspoons or 24 grams per day (women)
 - Above 9 teaspoons or 36 grams per day (men)
- “Hidden” in breads, drinks, and cereals
 - Harvard T.H. Chan (2019)
- Signs and symptoms of sugar overload
 - Appearance: acne, weight gain
 - Social/emotional: irritability, fatigue, restlessness
 - Diet: increase hunger, increase craving/desire of sweets
 - (Revelant, 2021)

Morbidity and Mortality

- High sugar diet is associated with:
 - Metabolic syndrome and obesity
 - Heart disease
 - Type 2 Diabetes
 - Cancer
 - Stomach, Liver, Gallbladder, Kidney, Uterine, Ovarian, Breast, Esophageal, Pancreas, Multiple Myeloma, Colorectal (CDC, 2021b)
 - Tooth decay and poor oral health
- (Throsby, 2018, 954)

Social Determinants of Health

- **GENDER**

- Men tend to have more added in sugars in diet (Ricciuto, 2021)

- **AGE**

- Men between 50-59 have the highest mean of added sugars (Ricciuto, 2021)

- **MARITAL STATUS**

- No evidence proof provided on relationship status

- **ETHNIC GROUP**

- African Americans median intake 22.9 teaspoons and Caucasian median intake 20.2 teaspoons
 - (Ricciuto, 2021)

Environmental Attributes

- **Food Desert**
 - In Cleveland Heights the only grocery store north of Mayfield Rd is Save-a-Lot and accessibility to it using public transportation is difficult.
 - Save-a-Lot has limited healthy food options for buyers to choose, many are processed and have added sugars.
- **Fast Food**
 - In Cleveland Heights there are many fast food options around the 44112 zip code, fast food places sell mostly processed foods high in added sugar, unhealthy fats, and salt.
 - Studies show fast food/unhealthy foods are cheaper than healthy foods at grocery stores.
- **Economic Status**
 - Lower income households show increase in purchase of sugar beverage
 - Higher income family show purchasing of fruits and vegetables more frequently
 - Overall, US households are purchasing/consuming lower quality foods for dietary needs
 - (French, 2019)
- **Housing**
 - Median value of occupied homes is \$128,700; price of buying homes in Cleveland Heights ranges from \$69,900 to \$1,750,000 (Zillow, 2022)
- **Education**
 - The percentage of adults who have a high school degree in Cleveland Heights is 94.9% and the percentage of adults with a Bachelor's degree is 54.9% (United States Census Bureau, 2020)
- **Occupation**
 - Total of 21,800 workers employed in the City of Cleveland Heights
 - The main jobs in Cleveland Heights include education instruction and library, management, office and administration, sales, business and financial operations, food preparations and serving occupations (Data USA, n.d.).

Community Nursing Diagnosis

Easy access to high sugar foods compared to healthier alternatives among low-income adults age 45-65 in the 44112 zip code of Cleveland Heights, Ohio related to food desert as demonstrated in consumers spending 2.5x more on high sugar foods than produce in 2021, only one grocery store and no restaurants north of Mayfield Road, higher prices of fresh fruits and vegetables compared to high sugar foods, and high rates of sugar-related chronic diseases in the 44112 zip code.

- This problem is an epidemic

Interventions

- Hold an educational seminar on reading how to interpret food labels at the local recreation center (U.S. Food & Drug Administration, 2020).
 - Food labels indicate the amount of added sugars and how many serving sizes per package
- Collaborate with community partners, such as churches, schools, and local businesses, to establish a community garden in the 44112 zip code (Ruck, 2020, 31).
 - Provides natural food options and more cost effective, especially effective in food desert areas
- Provide an informational handout about low-sugar drink options in grocery stores and supermarkets (American Heart Association, n.d.b).
 - Soft drinks and teas are often very high in added sugar, instead suggest alternatives such as unsweetened tea, water, or use fruit to flavor your drink
- Hold a cooking class for community members receiving SNAP to teach them how to prepare low-sugar recipes using ingredients available at the Save-a-Lot on Noble Road (Dietitians of Canada, 2018).
 - Using fruits such as raisins, bananas, and dates to add natural sweetness or adding extracts such as maple, vanilla, orange or lemon

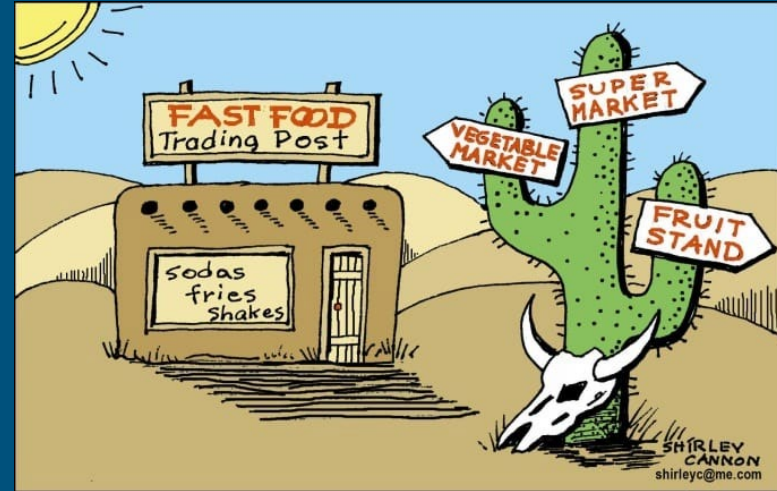

Health Disparities

- **Food Desert/Food Swamp** -- less healthy food options, higher prices of healthy foods because of demand, concentration of fast food restaurants (Brace et al., 2017, 17; Testa et al., 2020, 117)
- **Poverty** -- unable to afford healthier foods, buy what is cheapest, at risk of food insecurity with inflation or unemployment (Vilar-Compte et al., 2021)
- **Mental Health** -- comfort eating, eating to cope with mental and social anguish, sugar addiction, binge eating behaviors (Bruening et al., 2017, 1915; Jacques et al., 2019, 178-179)
- **Lack of Adequate Transportation** -- difficulty getting to grocery store, limited to what you can carry if taking bus, buy what is convenient, can't use curbside pickup, takes more time to obtain food (Vilar-Compte et al., 2021; Testa et al., 2020, 117)
- **Marketing** -- ads mostly targeted towards young



Hypothesis

- Sugar Addiction (Jacques et al., 2019, 178-179)
 - Sugar releases dopamine in the brain which leads to positive reinforcement of sugar consumption
 - Eventually leads to addiction
- Hidden in unexpected places -- people may not realize how much they are actually consuming (CDC, 2021a)
 - Added sugars found in many food items
 - Sugar Sweetened Beverages (SSB) main culprit, but many items that may seem “healthier” have hidden sugars
 - I.e. “low-fat” yogurt, protein bars, condiments, etc.



Gaps in Knowledge

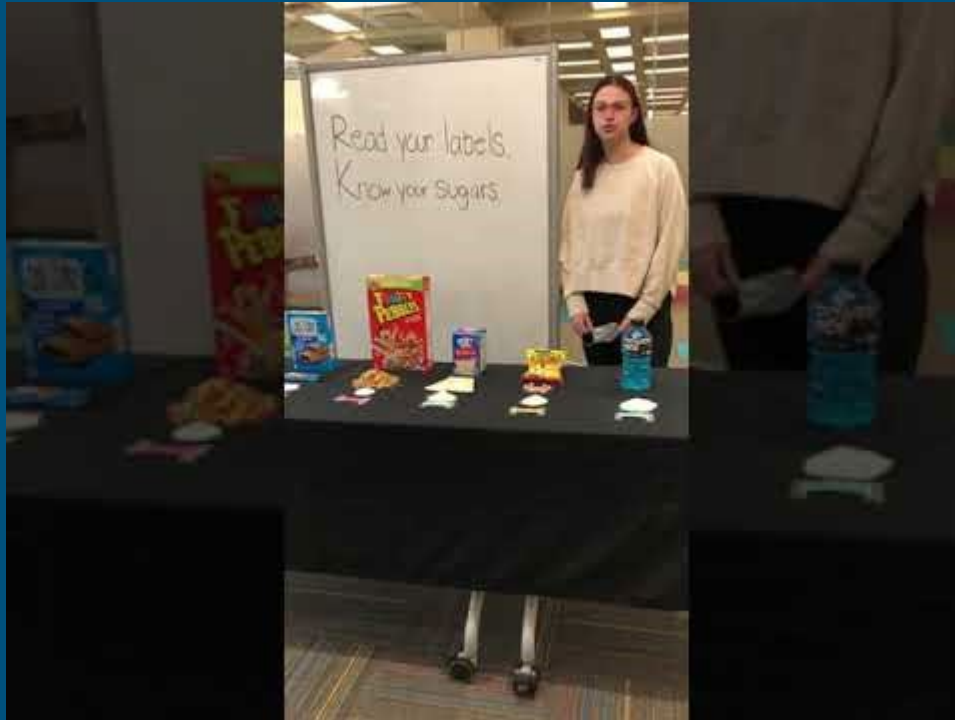
- Long-term effects on adolescents and adults
 - Early mice trials suggest there may be a correlation between persistent overconsumption of sugar in childhood and the development of hyperactivity and neurocognitive deficits in adulthood (Queensland University of Technology, 2021)
- Most effective health initiatives/policies to reduce sugar consumption
 - While research has been performed to evaluate the effectiveness of various strategies to decrease sugar consumption across the globe, no clear strategy has been identified as a significantly effective strategy (Walton et al., 2021)

Areas for Further Research/Health Promotion

- To help combat the food desert and provide food options low in sugar for the residents of Cleveland Heights would include:
 - Implementing more community gardens in this area
 - Involving local churches
 - Starting farmer markets in summer months
 - Initiating more food pantries
 - Restarting annual community health fair
 - Provide teaching opportunities and connect community members to resources (SNAP)
 - Collaborate with city officials to create more transportation options to grocery stores in Cleveland Heights
 - Only one RTA bus stops by the Save a Lot on Noble Road

Key Stakeholders

- Save-a-Lot (grocery store) manager
 - We ask that the displays at the store entrance to be rearranged to not have a large amount of desserts and candy as the first thing customers see or to include healthier alternatives alongside the displays, such as fresh fruit
 - Displays of high sugar items encourage customers to consume lots of sugar
 - We ask that handouts and signs be displayed providing healthy snack alternatives to customers
- City council president: Melody Joy Hart
 - We ask that the president help with approval and establishment of a community garden creation to provide a more cost-effective alternative for obtaining healthier food options

RESOLUTION NO. 30-2022 (PD), *Second Reading*

A Resolution proclaiming April 11 - 15, 2022 to be *National Community Development Week*; and declaring the necessity that this legislation become immediately effective as an emergency measure.

WHEREAS, the City of Cleveland Heights is a participant in the Community Development Block Grant (“CDBG”) program, of which the main purpose is to provide decent, safe, and sanitary housing, a suitable living environment, and economic opportunities to low- and moderate-income people; and

WHEREAS, 2022 marks the 48th anniversary of the CDBG program, which was enacted into law as part of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974; and

WHEREAS, the City of Cleveland Heights is also a participant in the HOME Investment Partnerships (“HOME”) program which provides funding to local communities to create decent, safe, and affordable housing opportunities for low-income persons; and

WHEREAS, the City of Cleveland Heights is a partner with the Cuyahoga County Board of Health in the HUD-funded Lead Hazard Control program, which provides funding for the removal of lead based paint hazards in low to moderate income homes; and

WHEREAS, this Council recognizes that the CDBG, HOME, and Lead Hazard Control programs are a partnership of federal, state, and local governments, businesses, non-profits, community organizations, and residents, and that the services funded by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development, which are administered by the local governments and often delivered by non-profit organizations, rely heavily on the dedication and good will of our combined efforts; and

WHEREAS, this Council believes that public recognition of the vital importance of the CDBG program to national communities like Cleveland Heights is essential.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Cleveland Heights, Ohio, that:

SECTION 1. This Council hereby proclaims April 11- 15, 2022 to be *National Community Development Week* in the City of Cleveland Heights and resolves that during this week this community will give special thanks and recognition to all participants whose hard work and devotion to their neighborhoods and their low- and moderate-income residents help ensure the quality and effectiveness of the Community Development Block Grant, HOME Investment Partnerships program, and Lead Hazard Control program.

WHEREAS, the Mayor has recommended to this Council that a portion of the cost and expense of lighting the streets and public places in the City for a period of two (2) years be paid by special assessment; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that the yearly rate of assessment established by Resolution No. 48-2020 be renewed.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Cleveland Heights, Ohio, that:

SECTION 1. It is the determination of this Council that it is necessary for the public health, convenience and welfare of the City to assess a portion of the cost and expense of lighting the streets and public places in the City upon the lands hereinafter described for a period of two (2) consecutive years, beginning with the 2022 Tax Duplicate for collection in the years 2023 through 2024, inclusive, at the annual rate of Ninety-Two Cents (\$0.92) per front foot, subject to a Corner Lot Reduction as set forth in Section (2) herein below, if applicable.

SECTION 2. Total footage is determined by the records of the Cuyahoga County Fiscal Officer, and for corner lots shall consist of the front footage (the front of the lot being determined by the property address), the radius or curve, and the side footage. If the actual side footage is less than one hundred (100) feet, the assessment shall be based solely upon the main front footage. If the actual side footage equals or exceeds one hundred (100) feet, then the footage for the purposes of this assessment shall be determined by adding the front footage, the radius/curve and the side footage, and subtracting one hundred (100) feet from this number ("Corner Lot Reduction").

SECTION 3. Two percent (2%) of the entire cost of said street lighting, plus the cost of lighting street intersections, shall be paid by the City; the remainder of said cost and expense shall be assessed upon all the lots and lands bounding upon the following dedicated streets, or parts of such streets, or public places in the City, to-wit:

No such assessment shall be placed upon any lot or land which does not bound upon a dedicated street, or part of such street, or public place in the City.

SECTION 4. The plans and estimates of costs of the proposed improvements on file with the Director of Finance and Clerk of Council are hereby approved.

SECTION 5. Said assessment shall be paid in two (2) equal annual installments, shall be certified to the County Fiscal Officer and placed upon the Tax Duplicate according to law, and shall be collected as other taxes; provided, however, that a property owner shall have the option of paying the assessment in cash within one hundred fifty (150) days from the passage of the levy ordinance.

SECTION 6. No notes shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of said special assessment.

SECTION 7. Notice of the passage of this Resolution shall be given by publishing the entire Resolution once each week for two consecutive weeks in one newspaper of general circulation in the City of Cleveland Heights. The Clerk of Council shall also serve notice of passage of this Resolution in the manner provided in Ohio Revised Code Section 727.13 on all persons required by the provisions of Ohio Revised Code Section 727.14 to receive such notice. Before the date of the

first publication, the Director of Finance and/or Clerk of Council shall prepare and have on file in her office her “assessment list” showing in detail the amount of said assessments which are proposed to be levied upon lots and parcels of land affected by this proceeding. Any complaints or objections against said assessments must be filed with the Assessment Equalization Board or the Clerk of Council within two (2) weeks after the completion of the notice of assessment pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 727.13 or 727.14. An owner who fails to so file an objection will be deemed to have waived any objection to the assessment.

SECTION 8. It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the passage of this Resolution were adopted in an open meeting of this Council, and that all such deliberations of this Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements, including the City’s Charter, its Codified Ordinances, and Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

SECTION 9. This Resolution is a preliminary step in the program of assessing a portion of the cost and expense of lighting the streets and public places in the City, which program is essential for the preservation of the public health, safety, and general welfare. Because there are other required procedures and time limitations which are part of the assessment process, and because the final assessment must be filed with the Cuyahoga County Fiscal Officer in September 2022 if it is to be added to the 2022 Tax Duplicate, it is therefore necessary for the public peace, health and safety of the inhabitants of Cleveland Heights that this Resolution be passed as an emergency measure. Wherefore, this Resolution, having received the affirmative vote of not less than five (5) members of this Council is hereby adopted and shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage.

No such assessment shall be placed upon any lot or land which does not bound upon a dedicated street, or part of such street, or public place in the City.

SECTION 4. The plans and estimates of costs of the proposed improvements on file with the Director of Finance and Clerk of Council are hereby approved.

SECTION 5. Said assessment shall be paid in two (2) equal annual installments, shall be certified to the County Fiscal Officer and placed upon the Tax Duplicate according to law, and shall be collected as other taxes; provided, however, that a property owner shall have the option of paying the assessment in cash within one hundred fifty (150) days from the passage of the levy ordinance.

SECTION 6. No notes shall be issued in anticipation of the collection of said special assessment.

SECTION 7. Notice of the passage of this Resolution shall be given by publishing the entire Resolution once each week for two consecutive weeks in one newspaper of general circulation in the City of Cleveland Heights. The Clerk of Council shall also serve notice of passage of this Resolution in the manner provided in Ohio Revised Code Section 727.13 on all persons required by the provisions of Ohio Revised Code Section 727.14 to receive such notice. Before the date of the first publication, the Director of Finance and/or Clerk of Council shall prepare and have on file in her office her "assessment list" showing in detail the amount of said assessments which are proposed

to be levied upon lots and parcels of land affected by this proceeding. Any complaints or objections against said assessments must be filed with the Assessment Equalization Board or the Clerk of Council within two (2) weeks after the completion of the notice of assessment pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 727.13 and 727.14. An owner who fails to so file an objection will be deemed to have waived any objection to the assessment.

SECTION 8. It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the passage of this Resolution were adopted in an open meeting of this Council, and that all such deliberations of this Council and any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements, including the City's Charter, its Codified Ordinances, and Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

SECTION 9. This Resolution is a preliminary step in the program of assessing a portion of the cost and expense of improvement of streets and parkways including grading, draining, curbing, paving, repaving, repairing, sweeping or cleaning thereof, removing snow therefrom, and planting, maintaining and removing shade trees thereon, which program is essential for the preservation of the public health, safety, and general welfare. Because there are other required procedures and time limitations which are part of the assessment process, and because the final assessment must be filed with the Cuyahoga County Fiscal Officer in September 2022 if it is to be added to the 2022 Tax Duplicate, it is therefore necessary for the public peace, health, and safety of the inhabitants of Cleveland Heights that this Resolution be passed as an emergency measure. Wherefore, this Resolution, having received the affirmative vote of not less than five (5) members of this Council is hereby adopted and shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage.

ORDINANCE NO. 42-2022 (AS), *First Reading*

By Mayor Seren and Council Member Cobb

An Ordinance amending Chapter 107, “Public Meetings,” of the Codified Ordinances of Cleveland Heights by providing that the City may enter into executive session for the purposes identified in Section 107.01 or for any purpose allowed under the Ohio Revised Code.

WHEREAS, the proposed changes to Chapter 107 would align Cleveland Heights’ public meetings policies more closely with state law; and

WHEREAS, the Council has determined that proposed amendments to Chapter 107 are in the best interest of the City and its residents.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Cleveland Heights, Ohio, that:

SECTION 1. Current Section 107.01 of the Codified Ordinance of the City of Cleveland Heights shall be and is hereby amended to read as set forth in Exhibit A hereto.

SECTION 2. Current Section 107.01 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Cleveland Heights as it existed prior to the effective date of this Ordinance shall be, and is hereby, repealed in its entirety.

SECTION 3. Notice of the passage of this Ordinance shall be given by publishing the title and abstract of its contents, prepared by the Director of Law, once in one newspaper of general circulation in the City of Cleveland Heights.

SECTION 4. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force at the earliest time possible permitted by law.

Exhibit A

107.01 PUBLIC MEETINGS; EXECUTIVE SESSIONS.

(a) All meetings of Council, Council committees, commissions, boards, citizen advisory committees of Council, and other public bodies of the City shall be open to the public unless an executive session is authorized under the applicable provisions of this chapter. Nothing herein contained shall mandate that any public body of this City permit public participation in such open meetings unless specifically required by the provisions of the City Charter or these Codified Ordinances.

(b) Unless otherwise provided in the Codified Ordinances, all meetings of Council, boards and commissions, and other public bodies of the City shall be held at the Cleveland Heights City Hall, or at other public buildings or properties within the City. Meetings held in executive session may be held at locations other than the City or school properties so long as proper notice of such meeting is given in the manner provided by Section 107.02.

(c) The Council, Council committees, commissions, boards, citizen advisory committees of Council, and other public bodies of the City may meet in executive session for all or a portion of any meeting for the consideration of any of the matters outlined immediately below:

(1) To consider the appointment, employment, dismissal, discipline, promotion, demotion or compensation of any public employee or public official, the investigation of charges or complaints against a public employee, official, licensee or contractee of the City or one who seeks to be an employee, licensee or contractee of the City.

(2) To consider the terms of purchase or lease of real or personal property for public purposes, or the terms of sale or lease of City owned real or personal property.

(3) To discuss with an attorney for the public body, claims or disputes involving the public body that are the subject of pending court action, or in the judgment of such attorney, appear likely to be the subject of a future court action or claim.

(4) Preparing for, conducting or reviewing negotiations or bargaining sessions with public employees or their representatives concerning such employees compensation or other terms and conditions of their employment.

(5) Meetings required to be kept confidential by applicable Federal, State or local law or regulations.

(6) Discussions of security arrangements in existence, or plans for future security arrangements, dealing with the public safety, where such discussions might reveal information that could be used for the purpose of committing crimes or avoiding detection or prosecution for violations of the law.

(7) To consider the proposed terms of a contract between the City and a contractee or proposed contractee of the City, where the discussions of the terms or proposed terms of such contract in the judgment of an attorney for the City, might give an unfair competition advantage to such contractee, or be a detriment to the position of the City in securing contract terms.

(8) Where Council or a board or commission of the public body, is sitting to decide an issue or matter in a quasi-judicial proceeding, but only after all of the evidence to come before such body has been heard.

(9) Any matter for which an executive session may be held pursuant to the Ohio Revised Code.

(d) No vote of any kind may be taken of the members of a public body during an executive session of such body.

Minutes were approved without any objections.

Matter of Record

Personal communications from citizens

Marian Bryant returned to talk about the issue on Mayfield Road between South Noble Road and Warrensville Road, regarding the enormous barrels. Ms. Bryant is stating that she received no follow up from Mayor Seren after the last meeting when he promised to go out and look at them and follow up with her. She's wondering if they need to hire a consultant to come out, evaluate the situation and report back to council, she estimates it'll cost about \$40K-45K. She states that the pots have become garbage cans and now they have snow on them. She states she's committed to seeing justice is done in that area of Cleveland Heights and she plans to come to each of these meetings until she has justice.

Mayor Seren stated he has Ms. Bryant's information and he'll be reaching out with a little bit more information about the entire process. He stated that it's an ongoing discussion with planning.

Destiny Burns is advocating for two legislative measures today, the first is the measure to purchase the two buildings on Cedar Road near Lee, which she requests that the Council vote yes on. The second she states is the petition ordinance for those who oppose the Cedar Lee Meadowbrook development. Ms. Burns strongly urges the Council to follow the recommendation of the January 24 Committee of the Whole meeting and vote no to reject it. She's a homeowner and business owner in the Cedar Lee district and states the development would be a lifeline and it needs to proceed as planned. She does not think that the people behind this initiative to stop the development are going to be deterred but as a taxpayer and citizen, she's outraged by the waste of time and resources needed to facilitate

it. She recognizes the petitioners right to propose it and oppose the development but thinks that it's an attempt to invalidate a contract, calling it unconstitutional on a state and federal level. If this petition is going to be on the May 3rd ballot, she states she will do everything she can to defeat it. Ms. Burns thanks the Council for their support of the project, calling it vital to the city.

Fran Mentch acknowledges that the Council will vote down the petition initiative for the Meadowbrook Law public square but states that according to the Charter, they still have the right to get it on the ballot and they will do so. She cites an obligation to the signatories of the petition – where they received 3,417 valid signatures. She states this is equal to 30% of the people who voted in the historic mayoral election of November 2021. Ms. Mentch states the petition indicates strong community interest and concern. Since 2013, the city has tried to develop the 5 acres of land but she claims the city has never asked the citizens what they want what done with it. Three of the petitioners submitted three formal proposals during those years. In 2021, they asked City Council eight times that the idea of a public square be put on the agenda. The petition was certified two weeks ago and Ms. Mentch said someone on their behalf asked City Council and the City staff to meet with them to compromise and work out a better plan but she claims the Council refused. She states they can't be impartial because the city is representing Flaherty and Collins and not the citizens of Cleveland Heights. She's looking forward to victory in May and gave the petition initiative's domain name: Cedarleepublicsquare.com.

Danielle Dronet is a Cleveland Heights resident in private mental health practice. She's joining Ohio Revolution and Partners in Health Engage in seeking the City Council's endorsement of Medicare for All. She cites the spiraling effect she sees the majority of her patients go through when they don't have the means to pay for medical care. And the struggle is not limited to just her patients with long term issues, but with most everyone. She discussed the economic downfall that happens when people have to make the choice between paying their bills or have enough money for necessities with affording their medical costs. She said Medicare for All is about the ability to afford life without the financial death caused by medical bills.

Avi Horwitz is speaking on behalf of Rachel Collyer (a third generation Cleveland Heights resident and community organizer), urging City Council to introduce and pass a resolution in support of Medicare for All. No one should have to go without lifesaving medical care and make impossible choices between paying for necessary prescriptions or rent. It is morally imperative that we pass Medicare for All as quickly as possible.

Amber Akhter is a CWRU biochemistry major here as part of a student organization Partners in Health Engage, which focuses on local and global health equity. Despite the Affordable Care Act, 30 million Americans are still uninsured. She's urging City Council to support a resolution for Medicare for All. She's an aspiring doctor and she can no longer sit back and watch the healthcare infrastructure crumble.

Jordan Reif is a senior at Case and is also with Partners in Health Engage to urge City Council to support a resolution for Medicare for All. She concurred with Amber that the current system is failing us. She does not enjoy sharing her personal story but feels it's

important. She went into anaphylactic shock as a result of an allergic reaction when she was in high school so she now has to carry EpiPens with her everywhere, every day. A few years ago, she tried to pick up her EpiPens but the pharmacy was out, there was a shortage. She was offered a German alternative but it wasn't covered by her insurance so she had to pay out of pocket, at a cost in the hundreds, which is not affordable for many. We can't live in a country that requires people to make these life-or-death decisions. She strongly urges that City Council introduce and pass a resolution in support of Medicare for all.

David Berenson came to the meeting thinking he'd probably comment on the Cedar Lee Meadowbrook development but after hearing all of the people discussing Medicare for all, he wanted to talk about that first. He is a long-time type 1 diabetic. He personally supports Medicare for All for those who want it. Regarding the development, he's sad that they are voting either yes or no on the entire thing. He agrees with the need for the development but he also says there is a need for the green space. He wishes there was a compromise. Now that he's not 'overly employed' for the first time in years, he would be the first one to volunteer to be on discussion group regarding it.

Michael Bennett wants to thank the Council for their courageous action at the Jan 24 meeting to recommend rejecting the proposed ordinance. He hopes the Council takes up the recommendation and affirms it as a strong reaffirmation of the project. He recognizes the petitioners right to put it on the ballot but wishes it happens sooner rather than later because of the cost of putting it on the May 3 ballot and doesn't want to see it cost more if it requires a special election. He is confident it will lose at the polls once people see the need for the development. The plan calls for 2.3 acres of green space, more than double than what was proposed by the petitioners, though some of that is going to be private areas for the residents living there. He wanted to thank the Council for their vote.

Joanne Siegel is a long-time Cleveland Heights resident and small business owner. Her first request is that the Council honor the contract with Flaherty and Collins, in other words, she requests they reject the proposed ordinance. Her second request is that they purchase the two buildings on Cedar so they can be included in the development and her third request is that the Council elect a new Council Member who fully supports the development contract. She shows her full support to the City to enter into the contract for the development because it develops all the parcels at once rather than a staggered plan. She states that the citizens backing the ballot have not shown they have a reasonable source of funding for the public park. Who is going to pay to have it done and who is going to maintain it? She thinks citizens have had plenty of time to express their opinions and now is the time to act.

Walter Thiem wanted to thank the council, F&C Development and their architects for all the work they've done to make project happen. He thinks it's a good-looking project and the mixed use and ample public green space will fit in well and add to the vibrancy of the business district. He also requests they reject the public park proposal.

Communications from the Mayor

Mayor Seren wasn't intending to announce this now but in response to the communication they've received, he wanted to announce that he has drafted a resolution in support for Medicare for All with the plan to introduce it at the next regular Council meeting. He's currently looking for co-sponsors for the resolution. He recognizes it's ceremonial, but acknowledges that every bit of advocacy helps.

Council Member Russell states she would like to co-sponsor the resolution and give him additional information regarding some legislations on the state level (unions) that are trying to do that as well. Other Council Members expressed interest in co-sponsoring and Council President Hart indicated that it looks like Mayor Seren would have unanimous support.

They discussed six issues: the police department staffing issues, traffic stop data collection, complaints of random gun fire on New Year's Eve, the chronic problem of people speeding/running stop signs, and the Racial Justice Taskforce, where Robert Lampley gave a presentation regarding the goals on policing the task force is looking into. The presentation is posted online. It was basically a progress report and they are looking for recommendations in the coming months.

ADMINISTRATIVE SERVICES COMMITTEE

Council President Hart explained why the Ordinance is being considered under emergency.

Council Member Comments

Council Member Mattox recognized the service departments for an amazing job clearing the streets of snow. He heard great things from residents so he wanted to shout them out. He also wanted to thank the Mayor as he's made history as not just the First Mayor but the First African American Mayor, congratulating him.

Council Member Moore seconded recognizing snow removal services for their excellent job with snow removal. She expressed her gratitude. She also wanted to encourage residents who haven't cleared their sidewalks/driveways to clear them so people aren't walking in the streets.

Council Member Russell also wanted to thank the public service workers for the snow removal. She suggested the creation of a public registry for individuals who have their own snow plows to help residents to get out of the snow if they can't do it themselves. She wants to thank Collette Clinkscale for an amazing job done. She's happy to say garbage cans and trucks are coming soon. She has discussed with Council President Hart the ARPA funds for the Noble Taylor area. A meeting is scheduled for March 13th. It will only be for the Noble area residents (by their request, not hers) with the intent to narrow down their wish list for the ARPA funds. She requested the presence of Mayor Seren at the meeting.

Vice President Cobb also wanted to express appreciation for snow removal services, saying the residents have to understand that the amount of snow has been unusual and the city has done a great job taking care of it. He also congratulated Council Member Larson for her appointment.

Council Member Cuda highlighted neighbors helping neighbors in the snow. He welcomed Council Member Gail Larson as well. He also stated his friend passed away that morning of February 7th, he was a COVID long-hauler. Council Member Cuda wanted to talk about thinking about mask wearing, getting vaccinated, getting boosted and staying safe. He thought the way to honor people's memories is to get the word out and keep reminding people how important it is.

Council Member Russell wanted to thank the Parks and Recs department for giving out COVID boosters last weekend.

Report of the Council President

Council President Hart congratulated Gail Larson for her appointment and noted she wants to swear her in as soon as possible so they are fully staffed. She wanted to explain why they ‘declare emergency’. Emergency means it will go into effect immediately. If that language is not there, it won’t go into effect until 30 days after. There are some things they do that way, even after a couple of readings, because they want it to go into effect as soon as it’s enacted.
