Subject: Contract for Heating Ventilation and Air Conditioning (HVAC) Preventive Maintenance and Repair Services
Date: March 31, 2022

Requested Action:

Staff requests City Council approve the contract with Emergency Management Special's, Inc. (EMS) for HVAC Preventive Maintenance and Repair Services. This is a 3-year contract at \$48,5000/year (\$145,500 in total). Contract details are attached

Funding Source:

This contract will be funded through the City's Public Properties budget (50%) and the Recreation Facility Maintenance budget (50%).

Background:

The existing contract for HVAC Preventive Maintenance and Repair Services expired in August of 2021. EMS was the previous provider and has continued to provide emergency repair service to the City's HVAC systems on an as-needs basis. They also helped to install the updated equipment at City Hall, the Service Garage and the Community Center that were installed from 2017-2019. The city went out to bid to ensure best quality and responsive service for a good price.

The following factors make EMS the best choice:

- 1) The hourly rate EMS will charge the City (preferred rate of \$90.00/hr + parts & materials), makes them the most cost-effective bid over the 3-year period
- 2) They have previously worked on/serviced and know the City's extensive HVAC systems
- 3) They are the only company licensed to work on the HVAC computerized control system without having to subcontract out the work for the Building Automated Systems (BAS) installed in City Hall, Community Center and the Service Garage.

The 2 other bidders:

- 1) Had a higher hourly rate, per man-hour, for service.
- 2) Would have to sub-contract out the work on the BAS system at a higher rate
- 3) Subcontracting would involve longer response times and higher costs over the length of the contract.
- 4) Most likely the other bidders would also have to reinstall the BAS system in order to be able to work with it, which would be extremely expensive.

Pending City Council approval, EMS will be under contract and regular preventive maintenance/repairs will commence (something that has not been happening since last Fall which is causing most of the emergency calls for repair).

Timeframe for Completion:

The City needs to have EMS under contract as soon as possible so regular, preventive maintenance and repairs can begin, thus reducing the need for emergency service calls which are expensive.

WHEREAS, this Council previously enacted legislation authorizing the City of Cleveland Heights, Ohio, ("City") to establish an electricity aggregation program pursuant to R.C. 4928.20 (the "Electricity Aggregation Program") for the residents, businesses, and other electric consumers in the City, and for that purpose, to act jointly with any other municipal corporation, township, county, or other political subdivision of the State of Ohio, as permitted by law; and

WHEREAS, in November 2001, the electors of the City approved the City's authority to automatically aggregate electricity in accordance with R.C. 4928.20; and

WHEREAS, the City is a member of the Northeast Ohio Public Energy Council ("NOPEC") and participates in NOPEC's "Electricity Aggregation Program;" and

WHEREAS, on December 7, 2020, the Council of the City of Cleveland Heights unanimously passed Resolution No. 138-2020, to encourage effective plans to address climate change, a pressing problem already affecting Cleveland Heights; and

WHEREAS, on June 7, 2021, the Council of the City of Cleveland Heights unanimously passed Resolution No. 62-2021, to enter into a partnership with Power a Clean Future Ohio and to commit to the goal of reducing greenhouse gas emissions in the City of Cleveland Heights by 30% by 2030, relative to 2021 levels; and

WHEREAS, the City has adopted or may be considering adopting a sustainability plan, a part of which includes or may include increasing the renewable content of the electricity consumed in the City; and

WHEREAS, NOPEC has developed a new green program offering for its member communities with a 100% renewable energy content standard default electricity aggregation product, that includes Renewable Energy Credits ("RECs") for 100% of the customer's energy usage, to any current or new NOPEC member community that selects this program for the upcoming three-year NOPEC electric aggregation term (from the January 2023 until January 2026 utility meter reads) ("Green Community Choice Program"); and

WHEREAS, the City believes that participation in the Green Community Choice Program will substantially assist Cleveland Heights in meeting its goal of greenhouse gas emission reduction and contribute to increasing the financial viability of renewable energy generation; and

WHEREAS, on March 4, 2019, City Council adopted comprehensive amendments to the City's Landmark Commission ordinance to protect and enhance the historic and aesthetic qualities of the City for the enjoyment of the City's residents and visitors alike, and to further preservation goals by enabling the Landmark Commission to safeguard locally designated properties, protect properties as they go through the Landmark designation process, designate local historic districts where more than 50% of property owners consent, and protect designated properties from inappropriate alterations or demolition; and

A Resolution proclaiming May 2022 to be *Bike Month* in the City of Cleveland Heights; and declaring the necessity that this legislation become immediately effective as an emergency measure.

WHEREAS, bicycling is a sociable, healthy, green, and economical mode of transportation and recreation; and

WHEREAS, the United States Department of Transportation released a policy statement in 2010 with the purpose of reflecting the Department's support for planning, funding, and implementing improvements to walking and bicycling transportation networks that "foster safer, more livable, family-friendly communities; promote physical activity and health; and reduce vehicle emissions and fuel use;" and

WHEREAS, Ohio law allows for the use of bicycles on all Cleveland Heights roads; and

WHEREAS, Cleveland Heights streets and buildings are ideally arranged in a compact, well-connected pattern making it easier to walk and bike to businesses, schools, and recreational and cultural destinations; and

WHEREAS, the City of Cleveland Heights shares the goals of the Heights Bicycle Coalition "to educate and encourage Heights community members to use bicycles as a sustainable and healthy form of transportation and recreation;" and

WHEREAS, in 2018, the City of Cleveland Heights passed Resolution No. 37-2018 adopting a Complete and Green Street Policy aimed at developing "a safe, comfortable, reliable, efficient, integrated, and completely connected multimodal transportation network providing access, mobility, safety, and connection to all users," which the National Complete Streets Coalition evaluated as the best new policy of 2018; and

WHEREAS, the League of American Bicyclists have recognized Cleveland Heights as a bronze award-level Bicycle Friendly Community since 2013; and

WHEREAS, Cleveland Heights continues to assess its transportation network and connections to other cities and seek grants for projects that improve the safety and comfort of bicyclists, such as the Cedar Glen Trail that connects Cedar Fairmount to University Circle and the Lake-to-Lakes Trail; and

WHEREAS, Ms. Small submitted a contract addressing the provision of the above-described services, in the amount of \$2,700.00; and

WHEREAS, this Council believes that the contract and amount are fair and reasonable in relation to the time and work contributed by Ms. Small, and that the contract should be signed and she should be paid; and

WHEREAS, under Article IV, Section III of the Charter of the City of Cleveland Heights, the Mayor "shall execute on behalf of the City all contracts ... and all other instruments to which the City is a party."

FINANCE COMMITTEE REPORT

RESOLUTION NO. 29-2022 (F), First Reading. A Resolution authorizing the Mayor to execute a contract with Guidehouse Inc. for consulting services related to the use of American Rescue Plan Act State and Local Fiscal Recovery Funding; and declaring the necessity that this Resolution become immediately effective as an emergency measure.

Legislation Introduced

Councilor Larson stated Council was advised, in the first presentation regarding the contract, that the payments to Guidehouse would be 2-3% of the total ARPA funds expended (not to exceed \$250,000) and she asked Finance Director Himmelein if the City would be invoiced by Guidehouse as the funds are distributed or if there would be a different arrangement for payments. Finance Director Himmelein stated the contract is a time and materials contract, so Guidehouse will bill them as their time is used. If the City doesn't end up using their services, they won't be billed.

Councilman Cuda asked Director Himmelein what amount of the ARPA funds would Guidehouse be overseeing. Director Himmelein stated about \$10.8 million, at the moment. He asked why there is a variable rate on the percentage (2-3%). Director Himmelein stated that was the quote she was given prior to the Statement of Work discussion she had with Guidehouse. She said the rate ended up at 2.5% based on Guidehouse helping oversee \$8 million. Councilman Cuda stated he feels uneasy when he sees a government grant and then these 'cottage industries' pop up. He said their job is to spend the money as wisely and as impactfully as they can. Guidehouse's job is to see if they can make money from it, they are for-profit. He would like to meet with someone from Guidehouse to interview them and get some information, citing the scant information on their websites. He wanted more of a comfort level with understanding why this is potentially worth \$250,000 and what the interactive process between Guidehouse and Council would be as they make

decisions about how the money is spent. Director Himmelein stated she has the proposal from Guidehouse that has a lot of the background information Councilman Cuda is seeking. She stated Guidehouse is also providing the same services to the cities of Akron and Dayton; Dayton is the city who bid out the service on behalf of the state. She will check with Guidehouse to see if someone will meet with Council. Councilman Cuda tried getting in touch with someone in Dayton who has worked with them but hasn't heard back yet. Director Himmelein noted she believes Guidehouse hasn't started work with either Dayton or Akron yet, as they just signed the contract.

Councilwoman Russell asked Director Himmelein if Guidehouse is overseeing \$10.8 million, why doesn't the resolution reflect that amount? Director Himmelein stated they took out the part regarding Guidehouse overseeing sewer projects because the City doesn't believe they need help with that. Also, if Council agrees with the allocation of \$10 million revenue replacement, that amount comes out as well. There has also been an ask by Public Works to allocate \$2 million more to sewer projects. The amount was not put in the legislation because the final number hasn't been established yet by Council. Councilwoman Russell asked about the \$5 million allocated to the Noble/Taylor area and Director Himmelein stated those would be included and Guidehouse would help oversee those funds. Councilwoman Russell asked if there would be a final number eventually of what they will be overseeing. Director Himmelein stated the number also depends on if there is a program that Council doesn't want Guidehouse's help with, then Guidehouse won't help.

Councilor Moore asked what would happen if they didn't have a consultant. If they were to allocate some funds and spend them, and the federal government later deemed the spending as not in compliance, what would be the consequences? Director Himmelein stated the federal government could ask for the money back and they would have to repay it, but that would be worst case scenario. She also stated they could have some audit findings if it's audited, which could have future implications for future grants. Councilor Moore asked if the consulting firm offers any type of guarantee or safeguard so that doesn't happen or are they only providing expertise? Director Himmelein stated that it's more about providing expertise, Guidehouse doesn't offer any type of guarantee, however, Director Himmelein believes she would provide the oversight for them and she has an audit background and experience with grants and she feels competent to oversee their work.

Vice President Cobb asked if it would be possible if they could have someone from Guidehouse attend a Zoom interview at the next Committee of the Whole Meeting on the 21st. Director Himmelein stated she would ask but it might be short notice. Vice President Cobb asked when they are voting on the legislation. Director Himmelein confirmed the expectation was to vote on the legislation next week.

Councilman Cuda asked if the \$10 million revenue replacement was what was accumulated over the last two years. Director Himmelein stated the United States Treasury, which oversees the grant, came out with their final guidelines that changed the rules. Previously, the city was not eligible because they didn't lose any money over the past two years. Now, she stated the City doesn't have to prove they lost \$10 million, the government will give them \$10 million as a standard amount. Councilman Cuda asked how the money will be budgeted. Director Himmelein stated that, after discussing with President Hart, she believes it will be similar to what was done for the sewer project, where Council will allocate a standard deduction for revenue replacement. She stated the money is not in the general fund, it still has to be reported to the auditors and it is still audited as

federal money, it's just in a different program. She also stated the guidance she has to follow for the money is less restrictive. She stated the money is in an ARPA fund, a local fiscal recovery fund. She confirmed it can be spent more like general fund money. Councilman Cuda stated he is feeling in the dark about this money. He said if they take the money, there needs to be a conversation about how to spend it. Director Himmelein stated those details have not yet been worked out because Council hasn't yet created allocations. Councilman Cuda asked when would they actually get the \$10 million dollars. Director Himmelein stated part of it is already sitting in the bank, waiting to be allocated, and they would get the remainder in May.

Councilor Larson asked Director Himmelein if they would be able to get periodic reports to see where the funds are going. Director Himmelein said she can easily print out a report to show where the money has gone.

Councilwoman Russell asked if Guidehouse would help with the \$1 million allocated for business owners. Director Himmelein confirmed they would help with that as well. Director Himmelein confirmed that Council would approve what programs the money would be used for and Guidehouse would help develop guidelines to run the programs.

Councilwoman Russell stated the Noble/Taylor meeting yesterday was a huge success. Councilman Cuda was there. The residents broke up into groups and they came up with their wish lists for the ARPA funds and they will be ready to report once she gets a date from President Hart for the finance committee. She stated they also had a person from the county at the meeting who could tell the residents and business owners what would actually fit in the ARPA guidelines and what wouldn't. The residents also want to present a full wish list so Council knows what they want in their community for the next four years and guidelines for how Council can achieve those things.

Councilwoman Russell stated she thinks Council needs to come up with a code of conduct in reference to what happened to her last Monday. She wanted to make sure Council treated each other with respect, as well as the residents of Cleveland Heights. She wanted to make sure all of Council respected one another.

Law Director Hanna raised a point of order and stated Councilwoman Russell's discussion about yesterday was related enough to the topic of this special meeting but everything else is outside the scope.

Personal communications from citizens

Laura Marks stated she is there to update them about Heights Tree People activities. The group is entering their fourth year. In their first three years, they've planted 671 trees in the Heights area. She asked that people mark their calendars for Arbor Day Friday, April 29th, at 10 a.m. at the Community Center. She then listed the various activities happening at the event, such as the ceremonial tree the Forestry Department would be planting at the main entrance. She also provided the update that Heights Tree People are working with Start Right CDC on Nela View Road. Her group worked with the Cleveland Heights Forestry Department, along with Jimmie Hicks and Allen Rapoport, to develop a work plan. Jimmie Hicks and Allen Rapoport are going to solicit their neighbors for tree lawn trees and she stated there is a potential for planting 50 new trees on the section of the street between Winsford and Noble. She also stated Heights Tree People are offering free front yard trees along that street. Jimmy Hicks is lining up people who can water the trees through the summer. She wanted to remind everyone that her group plants trees on people's front yards for free and they would love to continue, sharing their email address: HeightsTreePeople@gmail.com.

Fran Mentch came to congratulate the community for earning the right to vote on Issue 9. She displayed her group's website and asked people visit it to support them. She stated Issue 9 is about voting yes or no on whether or not citizens want to build a public activity park in Cleveland Heights on the corner of Meadowbrook, Lee and Tullamore. She stated this is the only time Cleveland Heights residents have been able to vote directly on a local land use issue. Would the public park bring money to the City? She stated, yes, based on research by city planners and economists that the right size public place on the right site would bring 'feet to the street,' saying money follows feet. She stated their public park is the right size and in the right context. Business owners on Lee Road have told her group that they do their best business during the music festival. She asked people to imagine how a concert in the public park, every Friday night, would help the businesses, bars and restaurants. She then listed the various other benefits the public park would provide, such as it would be a destination for people and it would attract residents of other cities, etc. She stated it won't exclude anyone and would benefit the residents of the new development. Would the public park stop the development? She stated it would not stop the development, saying Issue 9 only applies to the 1.07 acres of the site and they can have both.

Bill Frank hoped they are considering reopening City Hall soon; as it's been closed for a while and he thinks the residents would appreciate it.

Council Member Comments

Councilor Larson stated they brought up Ordinance 78-2021 (which was introduced in June of 2021) at the Committee of the Whole that evening. The Ordinance is in regards to lead safe certification, the process of looking into the commercial properties and rentals they have, and making sure they are safe places for children to live. She announced that they would have a hearing where they would bring in the Lead Safe Cleveland Program to hear what they've done, along with landlords, child care businesses and citizens. They hope to have a public hearing within the month. Also, on April 18th, she stated there would be a Public Safety and Health Committee meeting.

Councilman Cuda stated the Commission on Aging needs members and he encouraged anyone interested to email them through the website.

Councilor Moore announced that next Monday there would be a special Women's History Month event. They have been accepting nominations for amazing women of Cleveland Heights and they would be choosing five to honor in particular, but everyone nominated would be named and acknowledged at the meeting. She also wanted to announce the Cleveland Heights Green Team is kicking off a month of events for Earth Month, including organizing neighborhood clean ups, a sustainability fair at the Coventry Peace Park on April 23rd, and on April 27th, they are working with Future Heights to have a forum on sustainability.

Councilman Mattox stated he has received several emails and has had conversations with residents asking why Council is investing their time on addressing national and international issues like Medicare for All and Ukraine, etc., so he wanted to spend some time explaining where Council is coming from. He quoted MLK, stating it is so critical that they speak out for the marginalized. He stated one of the reasons he is proud to be a Cleveland Heights resident is that they lead on issues, where others tend to be silent. It is important that when you see an injustice, you must address the injustice, whether it is local, national or international. To any resident that questions why the Council does that, he said it's because they believe in leading and that injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. As long as people continue to speak out, that's when change happens. He stated he is extremely proud of the Council and the Mayor for standing up for what's right, not just for what's happening locally, but across the country. It is critically important that each of us use the voice that we have to promote justice and fairness for all. He thanked Councilor Moore for taking the lead.

Report of the Council President

Council President Hart stated that it had come to her attention that some residents in Cleveland Heights believe there is a ward system, where one Council Member represents their own district. She stated everyone is At-Large, so everyone represents every area of Cleveland Heights. She said citizens can address any issue to any one of the Council Members. She then noted there is a Council Retreat coming up on April 2, 2022. Council would be discussing their vision for the City and their

goals for achieving that vision. She also welcomed the new City Administrator and stated getting staffed up would help a lot in the operation of the City.

COMMUNITY RELATIONS AND RECREATION COMMITTEE

Councilwoman Russell stated the Parks and Recreation Advisory Board meeting is set for April 19th at 6:30 p.m. at the Community Center. Also, the Commission on Aging would have a meeting on Friday, April 22nd and Parks and Recreation would have their next meeting May 2nd at 10 a.m. She stated it is during the day to make sure that seniors have an opportunity to participate in the Committee. Councilwoman Russell stated she had another announcement that MetroHealth asked her to make, but she is deferring to Councilman Mattox. She did note she dropped off fliers for the Health Fair at the Community Center and she would drop off more at libraries and schools.

Councilman Mattox announced that MetroHealth is putting on the 2022 Men's Minority Health Fair. It would be held on Thursday, April 28th from 5-8:30 p.m. at three locations: the MetroHealth Main Campus (2500 Metrohealth Drive), MetroHealth Broadway Health Center (6835 Broadway Avenue) and directly across the street at the Cleveland Heights Medical Center (10 Severance Circle). He encouraged all men to go get checked and stated it is so important to take care of your health; for both yourself and your family.

Councilwoman Russell also wanted to encourage all the men to go get checked out and to support the MetroHealth Minority Men's Health Fair.

FINANCE COMMITTEE

Council President Hart stated at the next Committee of the Whole meeting, they would be starting early (at 6:00 p.m.) because they would have a report from the Finance Director going over the 2021 results and there would be a recap of the 2022 budget for the new Council Members.

HOUSING AND BUILDING COMMITTEE

Councilman Cuda stated the Housing and Building Committee met that day at 5:00 and had a guest, Ben Greenberg, who spoke about nuisance abatement and vacant and abandoned housing in the City. Councilman Cuda stated it was a very interesting meeting and suggested people watch the YouTube recording, if they weren't able to watch it live. A follow-up work session is tentatively planned for April 20th at 9:00 a.m., where they would discuss strategy and the scope of the Committee's work. Councilor Moore stated the Committee had their meeting last Monday where they discussed many matters, including revisiting a municipal broadband feasibility study, the possibility of a sidewalk repair program, tree planting and maintenance, and a sidewalk snow shoveling program.

PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Councilman Mattox stated he would announce the details of the next Planning and Development Committee meeting at the next Council meeting, as they are waiting on the agenda to be completed. They would be discussing all current development projects throughout the City and what they can do as a Council to spur development and growth in specific areas as well.

Personal communications from citizens

Blanche Valancy announced there would be a public forum presented by the League of Woman Voters (she noted she is observing Council tonight for the League). She stated the League of Women Voters and the Heights Libraries are holding the forum to discuss Ballot Issue 9, the public activity park. The forum would take place Wednesday, April 6th from 7-8:30 p.m. at the Heights Main Library at 2345 Lee Road. It would be free and open to the public. It would also be livestreamed and recorded for their YouTube channel (under the League of Women Voters of Greater Cleveland, Cleveland Heights/University Heights). The forum would be a panel, comprised of two groups of citizens, one supporting and one opposing the ordinance. It would be moderated by a trained League of Women Voter's moderator. The format would be similar to the candidate and issue forums they've presented in the past, with opening and closing statements from each side, as well as written questions from the audience. The ballot language is available on the Cleveland Heights website and the Cuyahoga County Board of Elections website. The opposing viewpoints are available on the Friends of Meadowbrook-Lee Public Square website and the Friends of Build CLM

website. She stated the league is not taking a position on the issue; they are a nonpartisan organization dedicated to informing the public about all ballot items.

Laura Marks stated the City of Cleveland Heights needs to prioritize creating a climate action plan. She stated as Cleveland Heights comes back, they would either renew as a green city or they would not renew. A climate action plan is a master plan of sorts that would allow them to see how the parts are related to the whole, to increase their resiliency. She stated none of us are capable of tackling the enormity of climate change, however, a climate action plan would allow each of us to concentrate on one piece of the puzzle, knowing that others are working on theirs. She states, for instance, she only has the bandwidth to deal with trees. The interaction between things is what sustainability it about. A climate action plan would give them a master plan to move forward. She stated we need a climate action plan to prepare for upheavals and power outages so that the most vulnerable have access to food, water and shelter. A climate action plan would help prepare for when people come to Cleveland Heights for the water and relatively mild climate, referencing planting trees for people who are already claiming to be climate change refugees.

Council Member Comments

Councilman Cuda stated what a pleasure it was to sit with the other Council Members at the retreat on Saturday and listen to everyone's aspirations for the city. He acknowledged their communication challenges but he would say that they walked out of there feeling better about things and having a better understanding of each other. He stated he looks forward to the next time they sit down together and do the same thing.

Councilwoman Russell stated she seconds what Councilman Cuda said about the retreat.

Councilor Moore announced that the Cleveland Heights Green Team is partnering with MedWish to collect medical supplies for Ukraine. MedWish collects unused medical supplies and helps to prevent them from going into landfills. If anyone would like to drop off donations for any unused medical supplies, there are two collection drives coming up: one at the World Health Day Heights Bike Crawl on April 7th, 3:30-5:30 p.m. at Boulevard Elementary School and another at the Heights Sustainability Fair on April 23rd from 1-4 p.m. at the Coventry PEACE Park.

Report of the Council President

Council President Hart discussed the Council retreat, stating it was public therefore it was recorded, if anyone wanted to watch it. She stated they did envisioning and planning on what they want their City to look like in 3-4 years. She stated they worked on how to best work with each other. They would have another session in May to discuss their goals for their visions. She said they would then put down their goals for the year, citizens can measure them and Council would hold themselves

accountable. She stated on April 6th, there would be a joint meeting of the school board and Council.

Mayor Seren confirmed the joint meeting would start at 6:30 p.m. and the City of University Heights would also be attending. It would be held at the Community Center, in the big room.

Council President Hart stated a finalized agenda would be posted online. The next joint meetings would be held on June 29th at 6:30 p.m. and October 26th at 6:30 p.m.
