**PUBLIC COMENT (AGENDA ITEMS and GENERAL (combined)):**

- **Alex Pesta:** Urged City Council to pass the CLM TIFF tonight; the community voted on this issue with a resounding 73% in favor of this development project. The process has not stopped, work needs to continue; asks that Council, who unanimously approved the development agreement, to take action tonight and pass the TIFF legislation on the agenda tonight.
- **Catherine Osborn:** Supports the TIFF agreement on the agenda tonight; it will benefit everybody and the city and residents have worked hard to get this agreement passed. Urges Council to vote to pass the legislation tonight.
- **Korbi Roberts:** Speaking about saving Horseshoe Lake; many communities are served by the lake. Property values benefit from the existence of Horseshoe Lake, it is a landscape architecture masterpiece and a beautiful amenity that draws in and keeps homeowners, it is an Audubon designated bird area, filters water and fills underground aquifers. It is on two national registers of historic places. It doesn't cause flooding in University Circle, and it has a clean safety record of 170+ years, TRC showed there can be a solution to keep the lake in place and keep it within NEORSD's budget. The lake is free and equitable and available to everybody.
- **Penny Allen:** Here to comment on the sewer districts update they gave during COTW. The sewer districts update seems designed to make Council believe the process has been open and with a lot of public engagement, and that whatever they propose will be good for Shaker Heights and Cleveland Heights. The district is paying for the design of the park, not for the actual construction of the park proposed by the sewer district. So, Shaker/Cleveland Heights would be paying for the construction.
- **Christine Heggie:** During the NEORSD presentation they stated that public input was requested/considered; but they did not consider public opinion in their decision to destroy Horseshoe Lake. Only after they decided to destroy the lake did they ask for input from residents. They will not pay for park amenities or maintenance; a man-made park that is expensive to build and maintain. Where was the due diligence in seeking funding to save the lake?
- **David Russell:** SPEAKING AS A CITIZEN. Here to speak to residents of Cuyahoga County. Tomorrow is a big day (election day) in this Country. Our democracy is at risk; most people don't understand how important it is to vote. She is asking everybody to make a plan and get out and vote tomorrow. As of right now 166,794 have early voted in Cuyahoga County, that is only 6,000 more than 2018. It is one of the smallest increases in

this State. It means that our County is under performing. We need you [citizens] to turn out to vote. Everything you do in your life; a politician determines how it happens. If you do not exercise your right you have done a disservice to yourself and your future children. Doors open at 7am tomorrow!

**RESOLUTION NO. 159-2022(CRR): *First Reading.*** A Resolution authorizing and directing the Mayor to enter into negotiations with the Cleveland Heights-University Heights City School District for a mutually beneficial agreement for the use of each other's meeting and recreational facilities; indicating the Mayor's and this Council's commitment to such an agreement; and declaring the necessity that this legislation become immediately effective as an emergency measure.

Discussion: President Hart believes this is a good piece of legislation intended to move the CLM project along. Councilor Larson supports this legislation, separating the facilities agreement from the finance portion of the CLM legislation makes sense; a shared facilities agreement is a welcome agreement and making it separate allows for more frequent review. Councilman Mattox hopes the schoolboard will see that this Council is committed to having a partnership with them; however, he is adamant about keeping this separate from the CLM project, in order to not set any future presidents. Mayor stated he had brought up facilities sharing agreement ideas during his time as a councilmember. The goal of a multilateral sharing agreement is a complex question because of two municipal jurisdictions we encompass, but he thinks it is doable. This is a first step and hope it shows we as a city want to collaborate with the school district.

### **COUNCIL MEMBER COMMENTS:**

- **Councilor Larson:** COVID cases up 19% in Cuyahoga County since two weeks ago. Encourages everybody to get their vaccination/booster. The Tiger's (high school football) had an exciting game against St. Ignatius; they lost by one point but ended a great season. Also, the performance of Sister Act she saw made our city proud.
- **Councilman Cuda:** There is a huge housing crisis in this country; rent is going up, investors are swooping in and buying up properties. What it is doing to cities is of a crisis proportion, and he believes it was an issue that was a missed opportunity for candidates in this years elections. On a positive note, in Ohio, Hamilton County for example, are buying up properties (vacant and abandoned) so that their CDC's could renovate and sell to owner occupants. There is legislation currently being talked about in our State for allowing CDCs to be able to purchase properties at sheriff sale.
- **Vice President Cobb:** No Comment

- **Councilman Mattox:** Encourages everybody to vote! It's 2022 and his granddaughter has less rights over her body than her great grandmother did. We have to roll back what is happening in this Country and the only way to do that is use your voice, your vote. It has never mattered more than it does right now. Call somebody in your groups/families to see if they need a ride, post on social media to remind people to vote!
- **Councilor Moore:** Hopes everybody has enjoyed our 70-degree November weather. This is another reason to vote, we know there are people who are running for office who want to continue strip rights for women and members of the LGBTQ+ community, but there are also people who deny the climate crisis and want to roll back the minuscule progress we have made. The climate crisis is accelerating and we must act, and we cannot put people in power who deny it is even happening. On November 17<sup>th</sup> the Doan Brook Watershed Partnership will be having their annual meeting which is open to the public; speaker will be Dr. Sheri Mason, she guides policy change internationally on microplastics in our oceans, and she is a very engaging speaker. Heights Arts Holiday store is open featuring gifts made by local artists and artisans.
- **Councilwoman Russell:** During canvassing she has discovered a lot of people don't know our judicial system; she has partnered with Judge Costello and with FutureHeights and will be doing a series of "You Talk, I Listen" to help our community understand our judicial system. The first will be Saturday, November 19 from 10:30am-12:30pm at the Disciple Christian Church at 3663 Mayfield Rd. Discussing tenant and landlord law, and housing partners will come in to talk about renter assistance programs and legal aid for those having problems with landlords.


### **COUNCIL PRESIDENT REPORT:**
